RECENT HAPPENINGS



On April 10th many of us enjoyed a lecture by noted experimental psychologist **Steven Pinker** at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights. Part of the museum's Fragile Freedoms series, Pinker's presentation comprised a summary of evidence and arguments from his book "The Better Angels of our Nature" entitled "A history of violence and humanity." In it he presented many statistics about rates of murder and violent crime from many countries spanning the approximately 800 years that such figures have

been available. Combined with stats about social change, Pinker made a strong argument that humans have become decreasingly violent over time. He rejected the idea that human nature has changed in that time, proposing instead that various cultural and historical innovations have combined to make violence less acceptable and desirable; innovations like democracy, literature and media, international trade and cooperation.

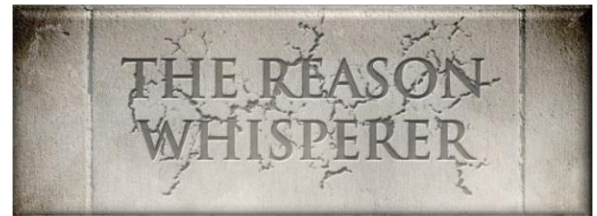
The controversy created by this thesis was represented well in the questions posed in the Q&A session, with most queries expressing opposition to Pinker's conclusion. He answered by stating his working definition of violence and why it mattered, reminding us how this trend is general and subject to local and temporal lapses, and how our brain processes can fool us into thinking that the past was less violent.

At the following reception, Pinker signed books, posed for pictures, and answered questions from fans and critics alike. It was a privilege to meet and learn from one of the world's leading intellectuals.

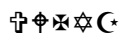
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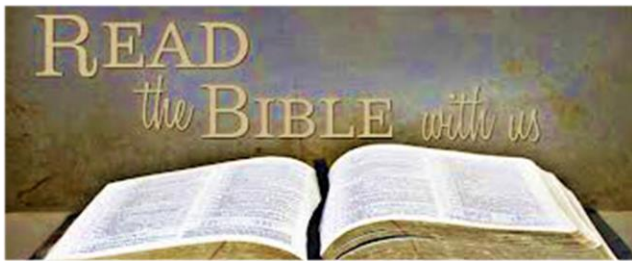
Those of us at our April meeting had a rare chance to see the personal side of a public persona. Our guest speaker, **Dr. Pete Boghossian**, joined us via Skype from his home in Portland. We caught him after a nap which made him late to the meeting (thanks to Chad Froese for filling in the gap with a report of Steven Pinker's speech!) When Pete joined us we enjoyed an informal and informative discussion, interrupted by his children and dogs running around the house. Such a great way to get to know the real humanist behind the academic!

A few highlights and take-home points for those who missed this: Pete's proposed TV

show sounds exciting – watch for the promotional trailer soon on his Facebook page [‘The Reason Whisperer’](#). There is no one way to reach people; everyone responds to different triggers. Don’t speak of ‘losing your faith’ - losing something implies wanting it back; instead speak of abandoning it. Pete is trying to concentrate his efforts more on reaching religious audiences rather than speaking at atheist conferences, since his intent is to promote reason to the wider community and there are only limited gains to be made by speaking to already secular groups. He acknowledged that there is still more to be done in the area of recovering from religion once people have abandoned faith and accepted reason. He closed with this advice: try to leave the world less superstitious, more kind, and more rational.



OPERATION ‘READ THE BIBLE’



Have you ever read the Christian Bible? The whole book, not just sanitized versions of familiar stories like Noah’s ark and the birth of Jesus. Have you thought about reading it and didn’t make good on your resolution? It’s a daunting task. There are 929 chapters in the Old Testament and 260 chapters in the New Testament, for a total of 1,189 chapters (on average, 18 per book). Yet it’s considered a literary masterpiece. Christian apologists base many or most of their arguments on it. And one of the responses most often heard from non-believers when asked what turned them away from faith was ‘I read the bible’. We should all be at least familiar with it.

In 2011 I attempted to read the whole bible in one year under the guidance of blogger who posted daily readings. He started off gung-ho in January, but got behind in spring and summer. He got sidetracked by apologists arguing on his blog. It took us almost a year to finish the Old Testament. In Jan 2012 we began the New

Testament, but he gave up shortly afterward. I plodded along and finished on my own in late spring. I learned a lot from that experience. Committing to reading every day is more than most of us can manage, and I hadn’t realized how tedious and irrelevant much of the Bible is.

I read the Skeptics’ Annotated Bible – the King James Version with notes by Steve Wells. All the contradictions and inaccuracies are pointed out, as well as violence, sexism, intolerance, etc. It can be read free online at <http://skepticsannotatedbible.com/>, and is also available in print. I bought a copy for my reference shelf, and now that it’s sitting there, I feel I should re-read it. I will understand a bit more this time, now that I have a basic idea of what’s in there.

But why go it alone? It will be more fun with a group. I will post a reading guide each month in the newsletter, less intense than the 1 year version. Completing the whole book in a year means keeping up with the readings every single day; if you miss even one or two days, it’s easy to fall behind and become inclined to give up. So I will stretch the 1 year reading guide out to around 16 months by only reading 5 days a week. This will make it easier to keep up, and we should still finish sometime in the fall of 2015. Now you have no excuses!

Any version of the bible will do, print or online. Comparing translations and interpretations is part of the fun. A good website if you want to compare versions is Bible Gateway <http://www.biblegateway.com/versions/> which has dozens of options and is searchable. For example, Numbers 23:22 in the King James Version mentions unicorns; in more recent translations the beast has become a wild ox. Hmmmmmm.

Those of us on Facebook can discuss our readings on the Manitoba Humanists ‘Closed Group’ page. I will start the ball rolling when I begin, but I am NOT a biblical scholar – this will be a group project. Amazed at what you’re reading? Don’t understand it? Hopefully we can answer each other’s questions and all learn something.

We will start June 1st, since it’s usually easier to find time to read in summer. This also gives everyone some time to think about it, find a printed or web version of the Bible that you like, and psych yourself up. Who’s in?
