
Is the science of Jurassic Park real? Can we clone a mammoth?


Professor Kevin Campbell will be our guest speaker to kick off the fall season. He is a biologist and paleontologist, and will talk about 'Resurrecting

genotypes and phenotypes from long-extinct species: Promises and perspectives." Fossils tell us a lot about how the anatomies of animals evolve and adapt to exploit new habitats, but what about their biology? Biochemical processes might be just as important, or more so, in the evolutionary process, but they don't fossilize. Recent technical advances in ancient DNA capture and sequencing promise to "resurrect" extinct animals at relatively low cost, which would open exciting new avenues of research, bringing together biochemistry, genomics, paleontology, and structural biology in the study of natural selection.

Correction: Dr. Campbell was previously identified as the Director of the Canadian Fossil Discovery Centre. He is actually a Professor in the Department of Biological Sciences at the University of Manitoba; however he is also President of the Board of Directors for the CFDC.

Highlights were seeing the amazing 43 foot tylosaur skeleton affectionately named Bruce; and a 'backstage pass' to the work, preparation, and storage areas, including a sneak peak of the new 9 foot long fossilized crow shark (not on display to the public the day after we were there).

Then onward to the actual digging. We were driven to an active site on a gulley where several fossils had been recently been unearthed. The plan was to carefully excavate the entire bank. With that in mind, we were given our digging tools – dental picks! This gave new meaning to the word 'patience'. But after an hour or so of picking at the



soil, 3 people came up with real fossils – Pat Morrow found an Enchodus tooth (in photo), Trevor Donald a rib bone, Jennifer D. a fish vertebra. A fun and educational experience!

IMPORTANT STATEMENT ABOUT FREE SPEECH

The Oxford Declaration on Freedom of Thought and Expression was approved by delegates at the August 2014 World Humanist Congress and the International Humanist and Ethical Union General Assembly.

Highlights of the declaration and important implications for us as Humanists include:



- Protect the dignity and freedom of all people by protecting their right to their personal beliefs.
- Pressure to conform to ideologies of the state or to doctrines of religion is a tyranny.
- The right to freedom of expression is global in its scope.
- to hear contrary opinions. Respect for people's freedom of belief does not imply any duty or requirement to respect those beliefs. The expression of opposition to any beliefs, including in the form of satire, ridicule or condemnation in all media and forms is vital to critical discourse.... Violence and censorship are never legitimate responses. All laws that criminalize language on grounds of 'blasphemy' or of offense to beliefs and values impede human freedom and should be abolished.

- States must not restrict thought and expression merely to protect the government from criticism.
- Freedom of belief is absolute but the freedom to act on a belief is not.

DO YOU LIVE IN THE BIBLE BELT?


Are you a non-believer living in the Pembina valley? HAAM was contacted by a woman in that area who would like to connect with other non-

OPERATION READ THE BIBLE



We'll cover a lot of territory this month – Joshua, Judges, Ruth, and then into 1 Samuel. Joshua tells of the entry of the Israelites into Canaan and their conquest and division of the land. The killings continue; Joshua's God is a God of war. This is also the book in which God makes the sun stand still. Although tradition holds that it was written by Joshua, it is probable that it was written by multiple editors and authors far removed from the times it depicts.

Judges features Gideon and Samson, and carries this content warning: "Judges is a violent book even by biblical standards... Read it yourself, if you have a strong enough stomach." (SAB) The highlights are so grisly, I'll refrain from posting them here. The stories follow a repetitive pattern: unfaithfulness to Yahweh, suffering and punishment, repentance and obedience, prosperity, unfaithfulness, etc.

Finally we get a brief reprieve from the violence in Ruth. It tells the story of the great-grandmother of David, and, according to the Gospel of Matthew, an ancestor of Jesus. Ruth contains the famous "Your people will be my people and your God my God" speech. Its stress on the need for an inclusive

attitude towards foreigners suggests an origin in the fifth century BCE, when intermarriage had become controversial.

Back to the violent history of the Israelites as we start on 1 Samuel. God orders Saul to kill every Amalekite "man and woman, infant and suckling", smites the Philistines with hemorrhoids, and kills 50,070 men for looking into the Ark of the Covenant.
