- disposal options other than burial

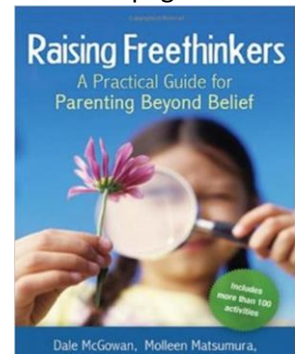
Don't forget to wear your Halloween costumes to the meeting!

Thursday 9th. Round Table on Secular Parenting, St James-Assiniboia Public Library, 6:30 PM.



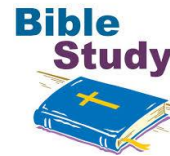
We're hearing a lot about this topic lately, as non-belief becomes more common and clashes of worldviews make headlines. Dale McGowan and Dan Arel have written self-help books

NOW LET'S HOLD OUR OWN CONFERENCE!

In September some of us traveled down to Fargo to attend **Zeteticon**, a conference hosted by the Great Plains Atheists. It's not too often that you're going to find the likes of Matt Dillahunty, Aron Ra, and Dave Silverman in the same sleepy prairie town, so it was well worth the four hour drive to see some of these well-known voices in the atheist movement.

The conference had a line-up of speakers who shared some great stories of coming out atheist. Beth Presswood, of the Godless Bitches podcast, shared her story of growing up in the “prong of the buckle of the bible belt”, losing her faith, being disowned and vilified by her loved ones, and finding a new community in the atheist movement. Her story ended on the hopeful note of reconciliation with her family and the message that sometimes love wins.

Dave Silverman, president of American Atheists, (here with **Donna Harris**) demonstrated his phenomenal ability as the



public face of atheism with a rousing talk about where the movement is headed, backed up with statistics that demonstrate that non-believers are on the rise. With over 30% of the 18-29 year old demographic professing no religion, it won't be long until we are a significant portion of the population.

We also had a sneak peak at the topic which August Berkshire, former president of Minnesota Atheists, will share with us early next year when he comes to Winnipeg. (Hint: You'll have no choice but to agree with him at the end of the talk.) We look forward to his visit. The speakers joined together for a panel discussion with questions from the audience on a variety of subjects, including free will and problems in the atheist movement with sexism and lack of diversity. All of the speakers were respectful and contributed to the conversation, demonstrating their commitment to making this a movement for all atheists.

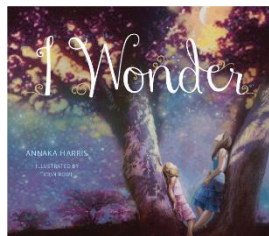

WE HAVE MORE NEW BOOKS!

Drunk with Blood: God's Killings in the Bible, by Steve Wells (author of the Skeptics' Annotated Bible). If you've read any of the Old Testament, you'll know what this is about. If not, then you'll want to borrow this book to find out.

I Wonder, by Annaka Harris. A lovely picture book which encourages children to question and teaches them that it's OK to say "I don't know". Probably best suited for 3-8 year olds.



Raising Freethinkers: A Practical Guide for Parenting Beyond Belief, by Dale McGowan. This book offers solutions to the unique challenges secular parents face and provides specific answers to common questions, as well

as over 100 activities for both parents and their children.

Beyond Belief: The Secret Lives of Women in Extreme Religions, by Cami Ostman and Susan Tive. A compilation of stories by women who have walked away from wide range of religious communities-including Evangelical, Catholic, Jewish, Mormon, Muslim, Calvinist, Moonie, and Jehovah's Witness.

END THE WAR ON SCIENCE IN CANADA!

Generally speaking, to be a humanist is to place a high value on science, both as a way to understand the world around us, and to guide our decision making. Well, for me, a recent town hall on "Ending the War on Science" was a stark reminder of the negative impact that our current federal government has had on Canadian science and scientists.



The impacts can generally be classified as:

- *Preventing scientists from communicating outside of their department without approval.* They have essentially been "muzzled", even when talking to other scientists. In 2012, Canadian scientists attending the International Polar Year conference were shadowed by "media relations contacts".
- *Cuts to programs and entire departments.* Funding has been slashed, and good jobs have been lost. The country's largest union representing scientists and professional public employees now estimates that between 2013 and 2016, \$2.6 billion and 5,064 jobs will be cut from 10 science-based federal departments. Of course, one local example of program cuts involved the Experimental Lakes Area.
- *Abandoning the collection of scientific information, and closing science libraries.*
- *Government policy decisions that fly in the face of evidence.* This point, especially, places us all at risk, should policies not prove to be the best decision, as they're not backed up by the facts.

This treatment of science by our own government has got to stop. But what can we do? Obviously, first, vote for a party that is willing to make science a priority. I

would also encourage everyone to contact your elected representatives, and encourage them to use their power to vote yes to science-related initiatives, meaning no more cuts and the restoration of badly needed funding and jobs. You can also join an organization such as evidencefordemocracy.ca, to learn more about the issue, and lastly, spread the word to your friends and others. Now is the time to act.

CHARITY OF THE MONTH

HAAM's charity for October 2014 the **Manitoba Shoe-box Project**, and it is exciting! Here are some details on how it works. The project collects shoe boxes filled with gifts to be given to women in shelters. Their website <http://tinyurl.com/nefzwf5> provides instructions on how to create the shoe boxes and suggestions for what to put in them.



Boxes are collected during the month of November, and drop-off locations are listed on the website. However, you may bring your boxes to the October HAAM meeting and we'll make

sure they're delivered. In fact it would be great if we could deliver all of them at the same time and let them know that they come from HAAM members.

If you're not crazy about going to the effort of shopping and creating the shoe box, and would rather give a cash donation, that works too. You'll receive a tax receipt from HAAM for a donation over \$10 and we'll do the shopping and creating of shoe boxes for you.

If you're going to get busy and create a box, please make sure to read the instructions on the website first. The Project needs to ensure that each woman gets a comparable gift. The boxes must be similar sizes, (which means don't use a boot box, for example), and each box should be filled with approximately \$50 worth of items. (See gift suggestions on the website.) Again, if that amount is a more than you are prepared to give, you can donate the cash for a tax receipt, as described above, and we'll add your donation to others to make the \$50 boxes. You could also simply purchase wrapping paper to donate. They always need wrapping paper for boxes that are donated without being wrapped.

One more thing, *please don't seal the boxes*. Each box has to be inspected before being distributed, and so the lids need to be removable.

THINK BEFORE YOU DONATE

How much attention do you pay which charities our public institutions are supporting and endorsing? It was brought to HAAM's attention by a member last holiday season that a number of public schools in Manitoba were collecting for **Operation Christmas Child**. This is a charity project in which school children fill shoe boxes with small toys and gifts to be shipped to children in third world countries. Then paramedics (in Winnipeg, our city ambulances <http://tinyurl.com/lherqwh>) drive in a caravan parade format to schools to pick up the shoe boxes. Children and staff form a human chain and pass the boxes from the designated collection schools to the ambulances outside. The toys and items are then delivered to a central depot for sorting and shipping. Sounds like harmless, well-intentioned fun!



However, **Samaritan's Purse**, which runs Operation Christmas Child, is a self-described "non-denominational

evangelical Christian organization". Their web site (<http://tinyurl.com/nb3pxv7>) claims that "Since 1970, Samaritan's Purse Canada has helped meet the needs of people who are victims of war, poverty, natural disasters, disease, and famine with the purpose of sharing God's love through His Son, Jesus Christ." Note that the main purpose is NOT to help meet the needs of people, but rather explicitly and proudly to proselytize a particular religion. In their reasons for packing a shoe box, they explain "Operation Christmas Child provides an opportunity for people of all ages to be involved in a simple, hands-on project....that focuses on the true meaning of Christmas - Jesus Christ - God's greatest gift." They continue with "Following the shoebox distributions, local churches and ministry partners are equipped with a 12-lesson Bible study course, titled The Greatest Journey, which introduces interested children to Jesus, shows them how to receive Him and follow Him, and equips them to share their faith with family and friends."

So the boxes of toys are essentially a bribe, expressly used to pressure desperately poor children living in developing countries (including Chile, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Equatorial Guinea, Guinea Bissau, Haiti, Ivory Coast, Nicaragua, Paraguay, Senegal, Sierra Leone, Uruguay and Venezuela) to convert to Christianity, and are delivered with prayers, sermons, evangelical tracts and pressure to convert. While a private religious group is

free to pursue such a goal, it is not an appropriate cause for a public school to be involved in. The school is plainly sending the message to young children that the Christianity at the core of Operation Christmas Child is stamped with the school's seal of approval. There are plenty of charities that could use our support which are run by secular and/or religious organizations who do not make religion a primary goal, component and/or requirement of their work.

Before contributing to this or any other charity, be sure to check out its mission statement to make sure that it's something you want to support. Don't hesitate to question whether a particular charity should be supported or otherwise endorsed by a public institution. If brochures about Samaritan's Purse show up in your child's backpack this fall, ask the school why they are promoting it. *The HAAM member who encountered this situation with his child's school last year successfully ended the school's involvement with Operation Christmas Child through a simple letter laying out the above facts.* Not only is change possible, changes are already being made.



At our September meeting, **Dr. Kevin Campbell**, biologist from the U of M, gave a fascinating talk on his work analyzing the DNA of extinct species like the woolly mammoth. The advances in DNA technology as a result of scientific studies in what seem (to many people) odd and seemingly unimportant areas is having major spinoff effects on how we will treat disease in the not too distant future. One of the most interesting and promising advances is "genetic editing"- a cell is taken from a patient, a broken or turned off gene within the cell's DNA is replaced by a gene that works, and then the repaired cell is reinserted into the patient. Great meeting and a great turn-out – almost Standing Room Only (extra tables were needed).

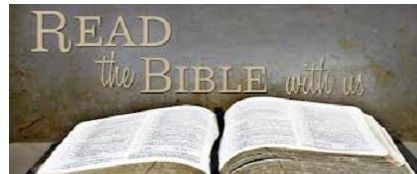

OPERATION READ THE BIBLE



Joshua, Judges, Samuel, and Kings make up the section of the Hebrew Bible referred to as

the Deuteronomistic history. According to Jewish tradition the book was written mainly by Samuel; modern scholars think that it was composed in the period c.630–540 BCE by combining a number of independent texts of various ages.

The bloodbath continues as we finish up 1 Samuel, but surely we are immune to the violence by now! This is where David buys a wife with 200 foreskins. Then into 2 Samuel, which, if it were made into a movie, would be rated "R". All the elements are there – rape, murder, vengeance, adultery, nudity, pestilence, famine.

Last we get to 1 Kings (1 and 2 Kings were also originally a single book). David dies and Solomon (with his 700 wives and 300 concubines) comes to the throne, but he doesn't seem any more humane than his father. Chapter 20 has the dubious distinction of containing 5 of god's killings, more than any other chapter in the whole bible. And in a departure from the usual forms of violence, Elijah kills 450 prophets of Baal by beating them in a prayer contest.
