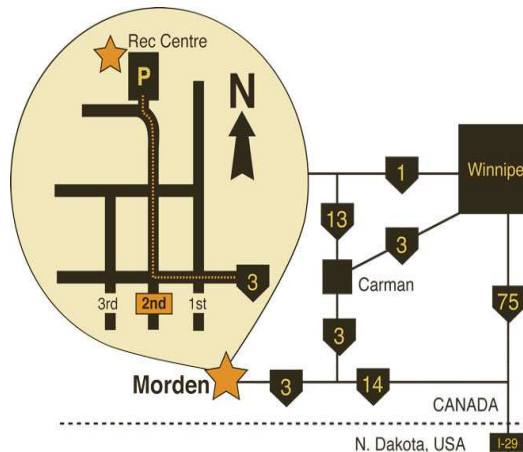

LOTS OF TRUTH IN THESE LIES

An actress at last week's Fringe Festival was accused of blasphemy and found the word "slut" written in permanent marker on her car. So a group of HAAM'ers just had to check out the play! Here's the scoop from our president **Donna Harris**:

I can safely say that the controversy surrounding the Fringe play "Lies of a Promiscuous Woman" didn't hurt its box office at all, since the performance we attended was sold out. If you recall, this was the show whose posters were defaced by thugs concerned about the sacrilegious portrayal of the Virgin Mary. In fact, there was a procession of religious believers carrying a statue of the Madonna, and reciting Hail Marys, outside the building as we entered.

Like so many others, we had to see what the fuss was about. I'm pleased to report, however, that the



show exceeded my every expectation. The writing and story were well thought out, the acting by the main character was amazing, and the show provided both lots of laughs, and plenty of serious emotions.

The story itself wasn't new.

Mary is a Jewish temple virgin who fell for the chief priest's handsome son, and ended up pregnant. Hurriedly married to older bachelor Joseph to protect everyone's reputation, she was a loving mother to her darling son, Yeshua. Nothing supernatural about his birth or life at all.

Mary speaks plainly about her own life and times, the church itself, and the misogyny behind her position in the canon. She has been marginalized in her own story ("only six references to me in the whole new testament"), yet, in her version of events, she was, in every sense, the god maker.

Special kudos go out to writer and director Audra Lesosky, who has crafted an intelligent, thoughtful, yet humorous piece of theatre, and to lead actress Theresa Thomson, whose portrayal of Mary is full of genuine feeling.

SUPPORT COMPASSION IN DYING

Calling on all Winnipeg supporters of physician-assisted dying! On **October 15th**, the Supreme Court of Canada will rule on the landmark Gloria Taylor case (also known as the Carter case for the right to die).

Gloria Taylor (c. 1948 - October 4, 2012) was a Canadian who was an advocate of medically-assisted dying and suffered from Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), also known as Lou Gehrig's disease.



In 2011 Gloria added her name to a legal challenge that seeks to allow seriously and incurably ill, mentally competent adults the

right to receive medical assistance to hasten death under certain specific safeguards. She was granted this right by a BC court, but the decision was challenged by the federal government. Gloria died of natural causes in 2012 without needing to exercise her right to assisted death, but the lawsuit continues. A positive outcome from the appeal to the Supreme Court will pave the way to legalize assisted death in Canada.

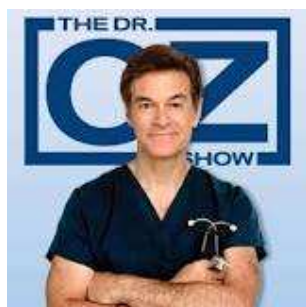

There are thousands of blogs on the internet from



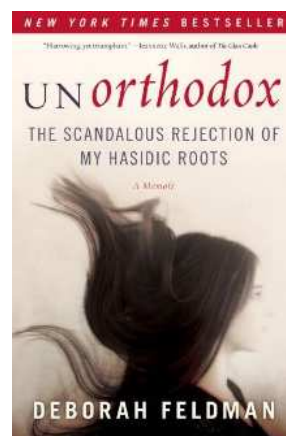
amateur writers and philosophers all over the world who have something on their minds to share. But did you know that we have some pretty talented people right here at home? Check out the blog of one of our own

IN THE LIBRARY

Did you know that HAAM has an extensive collection of books on relevant topics? Our librarian, **Diana Goods**, brings a different selection to each meeting.

Recent acquisitions include **Unorthodox** by Deborah Feldman (the memoir of a young Jewish woman's escape from orthodox Judaism), **Touching a Nerve** by Patricia Churchland (an examination of the latest brain research into consciousness, sensory experience, memory and free will), and **Horseshoe Crabs and Velvet Worms** by Richard Fortey (an engaging description of extinct organisms and so-called "living fossils" compared to their closest living, or recently living, counterparts, and how they fit into the evolution of life).



We currently have only two books on parenting: **Parenting Beyond Belief** by Dale McGowan, and **Just Pretend** by Dan Barker, but are planning to get more, as we have had a number of requests.

WE NEED YOUR IDEAS!

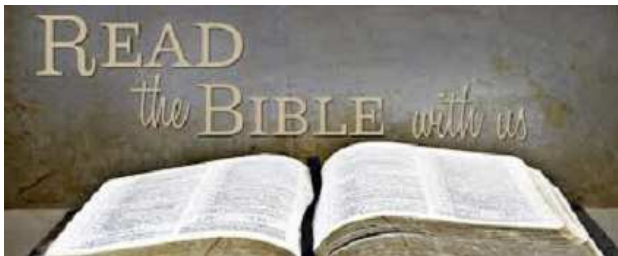

Right now we are particularly looking for ideas for **charities** that people would like to see us support this coming year. OPERATION READ THE BIBLE



For the first 3 weeks we will finish up the book of Numbers. It's not a fun book. God does a lot of punishing and killing, smiting people with leprosy and fiery serpents, and creating plagues and fires. This is also the book with the talking donkey and the man who was stoned for gathering sticks on the Sabbath.

Next we tackle Deuteronomy. This book consists of three sermons or speeches delivered to the Israelites by Moses on the plains of Moab, shortly before they enter the Promised Land. Chapter 6 contains the Shema Yisrael, the definitive statement of Jewish identity: "Hear, O Israel: the LORD our God is one LORD. And thou shalt love the LORD thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might." (Later quoted by Jesus in Mark 12 as part of the Great Commandment.)

In chapters 12–26 God lays out the Deuteronomic code - laws governing Israel's worship, the appointment and regulation of community and religious leaders, social regulation, and confession of identity and loyalty. A few examples: Kill rebellious or disobedient sons and everyone with religious beliefs that are different than your own. Women who wear men's clothing are an abomination unto the Lord. Don't wear garments of wool and linen woven together. A rapist must buy his victim from her father for 50 shekels. And if you don't obey all of these laws, God will smite you with hemorrhoids, madness, and blindness... and worse.
