

Winnipeg's Chief of Police, Devon Clunis

When Chief Clunis was first appointed, he made some controversial comments about how more prayer would help to solve our crime problem, and was surprised by the resulting backlash. Now we have an opportunity to meet directly with the Chief about policing in this city, with its diverse population, and specifically address our concerns as non-believing Winnipeggers. Chief Clunis will begin the evening with a presentation entitled

"Creating a Culture of Safety".

In order to maintain respectfulness and decorum, and to ensure that HAAM's concerns are addressed, questions for Chief Clunis will be prepared in advance of the meeting by our executive team. We invite input from all our members BEFORE the meeting. If you have a question you would like asked or a concern you would like to express, please let us know ahead of time (contact info is on page 6). Additional questions that arise during the meeting can be written on the notepaper provided at the tables and passed to members of our executive for consideration. There will be no 'open mike' Q and A at this meeting.

5:30 to 6:30 - Social time. Come for dinner, drinks, or just chit-chat. 6:30 - HAAM meeting. Be there to hear all the latest news and plans. 7:00 to 8:00 - Presentation by Chief Clunis followed by Q and A with our executive members.

We are looking for enthusiastic members to join the **HAAM Executive** in the New Year. We need people who can help us to achieve our goals of building a supportive secular community and promoting critical thinking in the larger world. Meetings are usually held monthly, (dates and times determined by mutual availability), with online contact in between.

The main activities of our executive council are to plan and organize regular events (like monthly meetings, discussion groups, and solstice parties), and outreach activities and special events (like our information tables at the U of M and the Morden Corn and Apple Festival, and the Film Fest); and to set policy and plan for the future. Our biggest undertaking right now is hosting a conference (River City Reasonfest) next fall. The more people we have with energy and ideas, the more we can accomplish!

Elections will be held at our AGM on 31 January, 2015, so you have some time to think about it or ask questions. The offices of President and Vice-President

are both 2-year term positions and are up for election this year. We are also recruiting members-at-large to help out where needed. To be eligible, you must have been a HAAM member for at least 6 months prior to the election.

When HAAM member Lisa Stark took her own life in September, she requested that donations in her memory be made to Klinic Community Health Centre. Klinic operates two facilities - a health clinic on Portage Ave and a counseling centre on Broadway.


The health centre offers a myriad of services aimed at prevention of illness, health promotion, and education, including family practice, immigrant and refugee health care, reproductive health, HIV, Hep C, STI, and teen clinics. Counseling programs include those aimed at domestic abuse, sexual assault, suicide, post trauma, and crisis intervention. They also offer education programs promoting healthy life choices and baby wellness. HAAM is proud to honour Lisa's final wish and assist this valuable community resource as our November charity.



HAAM is putting the "H" on Humanism! Our monthly charity program is gaining momentum. We recently sent a cheque to the Canadian Fossil Discovery Centre (September charity) for \$300, and collected enough money and supplies to make 7 gift boxes (about \$50 value each) for the Shoebox Program (October charity) for women in shelters.

ARE YOU "OUT"?



You may have noticed that some people in our photos and stories are identified by first name only. You may not know that some of our photos also have to be cropped. We need to do this to protect the identity of those who are not completely 'out' as non-

believers. Some participants in HAAM events decline to be photographed at all due to privacy concerns.

Even here in Canada, discrimination against nonbelievers is rampant. Many of our members and supporters feel the need to hide behind aliases or refrain from commenting on social media. The most common concerns are family rifts and job security.


If any of these concerns apply to you, here are some things to know about HAAM:

- -We will never use your name or photo in any media (like this newsletter or on Facebook) without your permission.
- -We do not reveal publicly the names of members or newsletter subscribers.
- -You can use just your first name, or an initial, or a pseudonym, if you prefer. This provides enough anonymity for many people.
- -If you would like to participate in online discussions or submit news or op-ed articles for our newsletter or web page, you can do so anonymously if need be. Simply send your contributions to HAAM at our email address, or message an admin on a Facebook page, and we will submit the content on your behalf.
- -You are not alone. Sad as it is to have to hide one's worldview, that's reality for many. For a full discussion of this issue, or if you're uncertain about coming out, there are several good books on the subject. Try Greta Christina's new book Coming Out Atheist: How to Do It, How to Help Each Other, and Why (available at Chapters or



Amazon); or **Mom, Dad, I'm an Atheist: the Guide to Coming Out as a Non-Believe**r, by David G. McAfee (in our HAAM library).

The violence continues in 2 Kings. Elijah concludes his ministry and hands over the reins to another up and coming prophet named Elisha. Elijah is taken up to heaven in a whirlwind by a chariot of fire. Major themes of Kings are God's promise, the recurrent apostasy of the kings, and the judgment this brings on Israel, (a vicious cycle of happiness, sin, and repentance). A few highlights of this charming book: God sends two bears to rip up 42 little children for making fun of Elisha's bald head; mothers boil and eat their own children; God has Jezebel thrown off a wall and feeds her body to the dogs; and Isaiah makes the sun move ten degrees backwards.

The Books of Chronicles are a narration of the history of the Jewish people, from Genesis to Kings, so almost all of it is repetition from these previous books. The first nine chapters of 1 Chronicles are endless genealogies; this is probably the most boring book in the Bible. The rest of the book mainly recounts the reign of David. God killing Uzzah for trying to keep the ark from falling may be its only real highlight. 2 Chronicles focuses mostly on Solomon. We learn that the Biblical value for pi is three, and that a man named Asa died because when he was ill, he did not seek the Lord's help but turned only to his physicians.
